Spreading Wings In September the senior class took their much-anticipated extended cross-country trip. This twelve-day flight covers a large swath of the western United States and is usually the highlight of a student's career at Moody. Half the trip is designed to expose students to big airports and busy airspace. They venture in and around Seattle, Portland, San Francisco, Los Angeles, Las Vegas and Salt Lake City. Along the way they delight in the Pacific Coast, Redwood forests, the Golden Gate bridge, Catalina Island, The Grand Canyon and the Great Salt Lake. They alternate from long stretches of open country to short final approaches, where the Control Tower urges them to "keep your speed up; there's a Boeing 737 behind you on approach!" They learn to negotiate with fast-talking controllers, requesting the "bay tour" of Alcatraz Island and the "mini-route" directly over Los Angeles International Airport.

After a weekend of rest in Salt Lake City, the pilots spread their wings again, this time through the Rocky Mountains. They land on gravel and grass, on ridge tops and valley bottoms, around mountains and next to rivers. The question on the first half of the trip was "Can you negotiate with the controllers and comply with their instructions?" But on the second half, there are very few controllers indeed. The question becomes, "How precisely can you control your airplane when a few feet, a few seconds or a few miles-per-hour make the difference between success or an accident?"

"Cross-country" means that the flight is actually traveling to a destination, rather than the usual training that doesn't stray far from the home airport. And this is the beauty of it: because the extended cross-country goes on day after day, it becomes an intense training environment. Students begin to think less like students and more like "Pilots-in-Command" (PIC). It's a bit like God does with us. He often puts us into intense situations where we think we can't survive, and we too easily forget that He is there, in the seat next to us, urging us on, and protecting us from harm. O, how much we can learn from Him, when we relax, trust him, step forward and see

Him work!

**Hurricane in Haiti** On October 4 Hurricane Matthew roared into Haiti leaving hundreds of people dead and 1.4 million urgently needing humanitarian assistance. While aid organizations spooled up to help, MAF was already there. In place since 1986, MAF has six families living and serving in Haiti full-time with three airplanes and a number of national staff. As the weather cleared, MAF was able to make survey flights to determine where aid was most urgently needed. As of

October 11, MAF had completed 71 disaster relief flights, carrying 233 passengers and six tons of supplies. Another airplane, pilot and mechanic have been dispatched from the U.S. to join the efforts. They've set up MAF's GATR ball satellite communications system in the hard-hit region of Dame Marie to supply communications and internet to relief workers in an area where other infrastructure has been destroyed.
